

Warren Central requires that all students earn **42** credits for graduation.

A student can earn up to 14 credits in one school year, for a total of 56 credits in four years (day school only).

Students wishing to earn Academic or Technical Honors diplomas will have to meet additional requirements set forth by the state of Indiana and MSD of Warren Township.



Academic and Technical Honors Diplomas

Right now you should be:

- Earning C's or better, nothing below a C-
- → Continuing with a foreign language or preparing to take one Sophomore year.
- → Consider pairing Speech with Health Sophomore year

C®RE40 with Academic Honors

(minimum 47 credits)

For the Core 40 with Academic Honors diploma, students must:

- Complete all requirements for Core 40.
- · Earn 2 additional Core 40 math credits.
- Earn 6-8 Core 40 world language credits
 (6 credits in one language or 4 credits each in two languages)
- · Earn1 credit in Speech
- Earn 2 Core 40 fine arts credits.
- Earn a grade of a "C" or better in courses that will count toward the diploma.
- Have a grade point average of a "B" or better.
- Complete one of the following:
 - A. Eam 4 credits in 2 or more AP courses and take corresponding AP exams
 - Eam 6 verifiable transcripted college credits in dual credit courses from priority course list
 - C. Earn two of the following:
 - A minimum of 3 verifiable transcripted college credits from the priority course list.
 - 2 credits in AP courses and corresponding AP exams.
 - 2 credits in IB standard level courses and corresponding IB exams.
 - D. Earn a combined score of 1750 or higher on the SAT critical reading, mathematics and writing sections and a minimum score of 530 on each
 - E. Earn an ACT composite score of 26 or higher and complete written section
 - F. Earn 4 credits in IB courses and take corresponding IB exams.

C®RE40 with Technical Honors

(minimum 47 credits)

For the Core 40 with Technical Honors diploma, students must:

- . Complete all requirements for Core 40.
- Earn 6 credits in the college and career preparation courses in a state-approved College & Career Pathway and one of the following:
 - 1. Pathway designated industry-based certification or credential, or
 - Pathway dual credits from the lists of priority courses resulting in 6 transcripted college credits
- Earn a grade of "C" or better in courses that will count toward the diploma.
- Have a grade point average of a "B" or better.
- Complete one of the following.
 - A. Any one of the options (A F) of the Core 40 with Academic Honors
 - B. Earn the following scores or higher on WorkKeys; Reading for Information Level 6, Applied Mathematics – Level 6, and Locating Information-Level 5.
 - C. Eam the following minimum score(s) on Accuplacer: Writing 80, Reading 90, Math 75.
 - D. Earn the following minimum score(s) on Compass; Algebra 66 Writing 70, Reading 80.

- Can I take a study hall or be an assistant? Yes, though not necessarily recommended. A study hall is a class where they do take attendance, but you do not get a grade/credit If you want to be a runner speak with the secretary in that office and ask them to email us requesting you.
- Can I take online classes? Summer school is largely online through "APEX", but remember it costs!
